





AUFENTHALT IM BUNKER

By the end of the war on May 8th, 1945, Emden was one of the most destroyed cities in Europe. The first bombing raid on the seaport city took place on July 13, 1940, where the main flight paths of the Allied bombers passed directly over the Reich territory.

From November 1940, a large number of bunkers and splinter protection buildings were built to protect the population, sometimes using foreign and forced laborers as well as prisoners of war. During the heavy attack on September 6th, 1944, Emden's city center was almost completely destroyed. Only the bunkers saved many people's lives. One of these bunkers on Holzsäger Street has been open as a museum by the Arbeitskreis Bunkermuseum e.V. since 1994

The bunker is marked by a band of text running at a height of eight meters, reading:

INNEN-WELTEN-AUSSEN-WELTEN

On the afternoon of September 6th, 1944, the city was reduced to rubble and ashes by the Allies.

THE BUNKERMUSEUM e.V. aims to keep the memory of this tragic event alive, to inquire into its causes, and to serve as a reminder of the consequences of National Socialism and war.

When it opened in 1995, the Bunkermuseum in Emden was the first of its kind in Germany. At this authentic site, the period from the beginning of National Socialism through the Second World War to the reconstruction of Emden in the post-war period can be retraced.
